Clothe us with your mercy and forgiveness.


Send us companions on our journey as we share your life.


Make us one, risen Christ.






First Reading Isaiah 25:6-9

More than 700 years before Christ, the prophet Isaiah proclaims the good news of God's salvation and calls all people to rejoice! God will make a rich feast for all people. God will wipe the tears from their eyes. And most importantly, God will destroy death itself.

⁶On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-aged wines strained clear. ⁷And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; ⁸he will swallow up death forever. Second Reading 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

The core of the Christian faith and Paul's preaching is the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As the crucified and risen Christ appeared to the earliest of his followers, so we experience the presence of the Risen One in the preaching of this faith.

¹Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, ²through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain. ³For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, ⁴and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, ⁵and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁴Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. ³Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. ⁴For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. ¹0But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. ¹¹Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

The resurrection of Jesus is announced, and the response is one of terror and amazement.







Christ Is Risen! He Is Risen Indeed!

Today we celebrate the festival of Easter. It may sound a bit ironic following the events that have preceded the day, the betrayal, arrest, and crucifixion of Jesus. The resurrection seems oddly out of place. The resurrection, or raising of Jesus Christ from the dead by God, represents Christ's victory over death. It symbolizes for us the hope that underlies our faith, our "Christ-Hope" as one commentator put it.

In the OT text from Isaiah, we hear: "he [God] will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death forever" (and) "God will wipe away the tears from all faces, and the disgrace of his people he will take away from all the earth..."

Isaiah is directing his words to the children of Israel regarding how God is re-establishing his relationship with them and the promises he is making. "Lo, this is our God; we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the Lord for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation."

Paul's testimony in addressing the Corinthians relates: "that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me." Paul tells us that it is through no effort of his but rather by "the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain "that all he has proclaimed has been by the grace of God that is with him and that through the proclamation of the early disciples that others have come to believe in Jesus Christ.

Mark's recounting of the Resurrection story focuses on the sabbath being over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and prepare Jesus' body for burial. They went to the tomb. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid (amazed or awe).

The aftermath of the story is the mystery surrounding the "true" ending. The short ending has the women informing Peter and those around him all that had transpired. And that afterwards Jesus himself sent out through "his disciples", from east to west, the sacred and imperishable proclamation of eternal salvation, realized through God's grace. The longer ending focuses on the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus to his apostles, concluding with Jesus' ascension and sitting at the right hand of God. Followed by the disciples (let's call them "apostles" at this point) proclaiming the good news everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the message by the signs that accompanied it.

Our Christ-hope is centered on Jesus' fulfillment of God's promises which we heard in the words given to us through the prophet Isaiah: "we have waited for him, so that he might save us. This is the Lord for whom we have waited; let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation."
